GOAL

The school curriculum requires core and option subject specification and a rational basis for the range of subjects offered, the time allocated to each and the co-ordination between levels.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. To meet NZ Curriculum and local curriculum objectives as prescribed by the Minister of Education.
- 2. To meet goals outlined in the College strategic plan.
- 3. To offer a curriculum that provides opportunity for achievement of students with different ability levels and on a variety of academic and vocational pathways.
- 4. To meet individual student needs, as best as possible, through a variety of organisational and instructional programmes including course differentiation.
- 5. To allocate subject time in accordance with national guidelines and with consideration to a balance between student need, subject and practical requirements.
- 6. To offer a curriculum that meets the Quality Assurance requirements of NZQA.

GUIDELINES

- 1. Structures should be reviewed annually with respect to the school strategic plan, national requirements and changes in the school community.
- 2. The school curriculum should take consideration of the school's Treaty of Waitangi policy and of Ka hikitia, the Māori Education Plan
- 3. There should be recognition of the status of the NZ Curriculum in Years 9 and 10.
- 4. All Year 11 to 13 courses must provide opportunity for students to gain credits towards NCEA and must meet the requirements of accreditation.
- 5. A broad subject base is desirable for students in the first 3 years 9, 10 and 11.
- 6. Year 9 courses are generally introductory and are not intended to preclude students from studying any option in Year 10.

- 7. Subject time allocations should be based on student need and should take into account the gradual development of skills inherent in many subjects.
- 8. The timetable is designed to allow for a range of future pathways both academic and vocational.
- 9. Senior students have the opportunity to study 6 subjects.
- 10. Course outlines, career information and individual guidance should be available to students before making subject choices.
